Transcript

Mei: Hello, Mum and Dad. Well, I did it! First day at work in a new office, a new city, a new country. I hope you're proud of your daughter! I'm proud of myself. I was sooo nervous, but I tried hard not to show it. Today was just an introduction, really – I didn't have much to do, but I met the team I'll be working with and saw some of the apps that they've designed recently. Steve (boss): And here's the games area. Table tennis table, billiards table. It's a fast-paced environment and these guys need to play sometimes – we all do. And here's one of your team members. Steve, this is Mei – she's joining your team.

Steve (colleague): Hey, Mei!

Mei: Hello. I'm pleased to ...

Steve (colleague): I hope you play table tennis. Welcome to the team. Hey, Steve ...

Steve (boss): Yep?

Steve (colleague): That project description you gave us yesterday ... I think I've got some better ideas. Can I come and talk them over with you?

Steve (boss): Sure, Steve! You know where I usually sit! See what I mean by 'buy-in', Mei? Now, through here we've got the kitchen area. You can ...

Mei: So I think you can see it's a bit different from an office in China! Ping pong and billiards! And a kitchen area? And telling your boss his ideas aren't very good and you've got some better ones! Remember your boss, Daddy, Dr Chen? He wouldn't be very happy if you did that! I think it's going to take a while for me to get used to this. Anyway, I'm sure it will all be OK. It's a good job, and I'm very happy here in London. I like my flat and my crazy neighbour. I saw him again last night on the stairs ...

Milton: Oh! Hello, Mei.

Mei: Hello. Oh! So you've got a part in a play! Congratulations!

Milton: Well, no ... I mean, I went to another audition yesterday, but I don't think they want me. They said I was too old. Imagine!

Mei: But you're wearing funny clothes. Isn't that a ... how do you say ... custom ... costume? For the play. Is it about a hotel?

Milton: Ah, this? This jacket and trousers? No, Mei. Ha! I wish it was a costume for a play about a hotel! No, it's my uniform – for when I deliver pizzas. That's my job. I'm a pizza delivery boy – well, man – well, person. That's what I do every evening. I didn't want to tell you.

Mei: Why not?

Milton: Because I want to be an actor – that's my job, not delivering pizzas. But now you've caught me! It's quite funny really, I suppose.

Mei: Yes, it is.

Milton: Oh well. What about you? Have you started the new job yet?

Mei: Oh, yes.

Milton: And?

Mei: It's OK. Let's say it's different for me. What does 'buy-in' mean?

Milton: 'Buy-in'? Something to do with buying a company, I think. I'm not sure. Why?

Mei: My boss uses it a lot. I think he means he wants people to share ideas, be involved – but I'm not sure. Anyway ... Do you ever bring pizzas home?

Milton: Just let me know when you want one – I'm very good at delivering them.

Mei: OK. Good night, then.

Milton: Night.

Mei: So that was funny. Milton delivers pizzas and he didn't want to tell me. So, Mum and Dad, I'm fine, the job is fine – so I don't want you to worry about me at all. Give my love to Jiang if you see her and tell her I'll speak to her soon ...

Robert: So, this is where you look for acting jobs, is it?

Milton: Huh?

Robert: This magazine? Acting jobs?

Milton: Uh, yeah. I buy it every week. I'll buy you a drink if you find something good ...

Robert: Just ... give ... me a minute. Ah ha! Here you are. Perfect.

Milton: What?

Robert: *Game of Thrones*.

Milton: *Game of Thrones*? What – the *Game of Thrones*?

Robert: Yes, the Kingdom in the North and Jon Snow and the Mother of Dragons and all that. There's an advert. They want people for a new series of *Game of Thrones* ...

Milton: A new series?!

Robert: Yes, a new series. They want extras – you know, not speaking parts – soldiers and things like that. And you know – I've never said anything before, Milton, but you do know you look exactly like Jon Snow, don't you?

Milton: Jon Snow? Me?

Robert: You just need long hair and a good beard – you're his twin brother. 'Wanted: Men aged 20 to 50' – that's you – 'in good physical condition' – that's definitely you – 'tall' – well, not so sure about that one – 'no visible tattoos' – let's have a look, turn your head. Yes, that's you.

Milton: Let me see – give it to me. 'Must be available all of September – must be prepared to move to Belfast, Northern Ireland, for at least two weeks.' Well, I could do that for two weeks – or more. And it's good money.

Robert: Can you do any of the fighting stuff? You know, with the sword – swish, swish, swish – or a knife. They'll probably like that.

Milton: Hmmm.

Robert: I think you were going to buy me a last drink – and then it's home and write the application. And who knows, Jon Snow's Brazilian twin brother will be discovered in the snow and ice ... Um, mine's a pint of bitter, please. When you're ready ...

Milton: So there you are. An extra on *Game of Thrones*. I've just sent the application. Wish me luck. Jon Snow's Brazilian brother is on his way! Mei will be impressed – I hope! Do you think they watch it in China? I wonder if she thinks I look like Jon Snow? Hang on – I can hear her outside.

Milton: Hi, Mei.

Mei: Hi.

Milton: Do you watch *Game of Thrones*? In China? Jon Snow? The Mother of Dragons?

Mei: *Game of Thrones*? Of course. But in Chinese we call it 权力的游戏. It means 'Game of Power', I think. It's very popular.

Milton: Do you think I look like anyone? In the programme? If I had long hair and a beard.

Mei: Um, I'm not sure. Maybe, um, a soldier?

Milton: A soldier? Nobody else ...?

Mei: Who then? Who do you think you look like?

Milton: No, it's OK. Robert just said I looked like somebody.

Mei: Well, I'll ask Robert if you won't tell me – next time we meet ...

Milton: So that was a bit disappointing! Just a soldier. Anyway, let's see what happens with the application. I don't want to keep on delivering pizzas and giving Portuguese lessons, although I really do like Robert a lot. He's funny and interesting, but he's always asking questions – 'Why is it like this?', 'Why do you say it like that?', 'Why can't I say it like this?' And I never know the answers. I just speak Portuguese – I don't know why I say what I say. Anyway, time to go. So, still no news from Mum? I hope everything's OK with her. Let me know as soon as you hear anything. Ciao.
